## **Celebrating Easter Traditions**

The egg has been a powerful symbol of life in Polish folklore for over 1000 years. Many customs and traditions have arisen around the egg, but none more beloved and widely practiced than the making of "pisanki" – multicoloured and patterned Easter eggs. Using nothing more than wax and dyes, a simple white egg becomes a miniature work of art. For centuries, Poles have used pisanki in a variety of traditions year-round including the all-important act of courtship; up until the mid-1800s, young Poles would identify the person they wanted to marry by giving them pisanki.

The Ogniwo Polish Museum is promoting the tradition of creating pisanki by presenting three Pisanki workshops before the Easter season. Workshops are open to people of all ages, and participants can chose to attend one or any combination of workshops, as there are no specific requirements or pre-requisites to attend. The workshops will take place at St. John Cantius Hall at the corner of Mountain Avenue and Arlington Street on the following dates:

Saturday, April 1, 2-5 PM Sunday, April 2, 2-5 PM Saturday, April 8, 2-5 PM

The cost for each workshop is \$8 per participant. All supplies will be provided.

# Weaving an Amazing Tale

Upon entering a traditional Polish home, visitors could be struck by the colourful woven carpets that would adorn the walls. Regardless of whether they contained simple designs and were made of coarse wool or were made of much more refined materials and incorporated elaborate patterns or designs, kilims have been a popular decorative accessory in Polish homes. They helped to keep the home warm and added a distinctive decorative warmth as well.



What are kilims? The term *kilim* simply refers to a flat woven carpet, a kind of rug without any pile or knotted fluff, or a coarse, thin hand made carpet. The Polish kilim is part of a large international family that has different names in different languages: Afghanistan shares the same name of kilim, while in Ukraine it is known as *chylym*, in Syria and Lebanon it is called *chilim*, and in Iran *gelim*. As the saying goes, a beloved child has many names. It also has many homes; while it is believed that these weavings originated in the deserts of Africa or the wide open spaces of Central Asia, they have made their way into the traditions of a number of European cultures, including Scandinavia, Romania, Hungary, as well as Poland.

Polish kilims reached their zenith in the form of *Polonaise carpets*, 17th century Persian rugs woven in silk, gold and silver threads. They are named Polonaise because they were first exhibited in Poland and bore the Polish royal family's coat of arms. Today's kilims are much simpler in scope. Despite being made of wools instead of silks, they are still treasured artworks. Their warm tones and frequent depiction of fields and village life are a beloved reminder of a simpler time.
